

# Zoe Dell Lantis Nutter receives 2005 Achievement in Aviation Medallion

Zoe Dell Lantis Nutter, received the 2005 San Francisco Aeronautical Society Achievement in Aviation Medallion. The annual award is given to an individual or organization whose work demonstrates significant achievements and contributions to the development of air transport.

While a student at the San Francisco Ballet, Zoe Dell Lantis Nutter was chosen to publicize the 1939–1940 Golden Gate International Exposition on San Francisco's Treasure Island where she first attained world-wide recognition. As the Official Hostess and Pirate Theme Girl, she traveled more than 100,000 miles by commercial airliner to publicize the exposition and promote air transport. Her appearances included visits to all the governors and the mayors of every major city in the United States while being photographed participating in state events and at places of national interest. Declared "The Most Photographed and Publicized Girl in the World for 1938–1939," Life magazine devoted two pages to her travels and publicity feats, such as the time she leapt across a 900-foot deep chasm at the Grand Canyon.

Ms. Lantis Nutter was appointed Official Representative from the State of California to the 1958 Brussels World's Fair, the Flying Ambassadress to Seattle's 1961 Century 21 Exposition, and the 1964 New York World's Fair. She has logged over 2,000 hours as a commercial multi-engine instrument pilot. As a member of The Ninety-Nines, an international organization of licensed women pilots, she was Hospitality Chair of the Powder Puff Derby, in which she has also flown. Ms. Lantis Nutter has flown search and rescue missions in the Civil Air Patrol where she served as an officer. In 1988, having served for twelve years on the Board of Trustees of the National Aviation Hall of Fame in Dayton, Ohio, she was elected its first female President and Chairman.

On the Saturday following the Awards Celebration, Ms. Lantis Nutter spent the morning sharing stories of her colorful history with an audience of admirers. It was with great pleasure that the Board of Directors of the San Francisco Aeronautical Society named Zoe Dell Lantis Nutter the 2005 Honoree for the Achievement in Aviation Medallion.

# JUDD IVERSEN PROFILE IN AVIATION

Judd Iversen joined the Society's Board of Directors in 2004. The former executive director of the USF Center for Law and Global Justice, Mr. Iversen was responsible for developing a program in Southeast Asia to assist in the reconstruction of the legal system in Cambodia. In 1999, he was a United Nations consultant to the Vietnamese Supreme People's Court. He is a founding board member of Legal Aid of Cambodia.

Mr. Iversen attended the United States Air Force Academy from 1962 to 1966 and is a graduate of the University of California at Los Angeles. He received his law degree in 1972 from the University of San Francisco School of law. He served on the Board of Directors of Full Circle Programs from 1984 to 1991 and was President of the Board of Directors from 1986 to 1987. Full Circle has two residential treatment centers for kids who, due to their problems, cannot continue to reside with their parents. He is a member of the USF Board of Counselors, and a former member of the Seton Hospital Ethics Committee.

Mr. Iversen has enjoyed a long history in aviation taking his first flight in a small Taylorcraft airplane when he was five years old. His uncles were pioneer aviators and his Uncle John Livingston won the Bendix Air Race three times. He soloed an Air Force T-34 in 1964 and became a commercial pilot and flight instructor in 1966. He continues to fly today. Mr. Iversen lives in Belmont with his wife, Mimi, and their two sons.
